Abstract:

Restoration of Antique Architecture and Theory for the Instauration of a New One: The Project of the Accademia della Virtù, Its Aims and Results

The publishing program of the Accademia della Virtù describes by far the largest such undertaking from the Renaissance. Its aim was to publish a series of 24 libri consisting of critical editions and translations of and commentaries on Vitruvius' De Architectura and a documentation of all material remains from Roman Antiquity: from the historical development of the urbs to all of its buildings, from all coins and reliefs to all inscriptions etc. But the aim of this 'Classical Archaeology of Roman Antiquity' avant la lettre was not an archaeological one. Instead, it was explicitly meant to establish the solid basis for a new architecture, and to be finished through 'interdisciplinary' work by an 'international' team within three years!

Though this program has been published by Claudio Tolomei already in 1547, it has largely been ignored or misinterpreted in academic research. In fact, it was believed, that only Guillaume Philandrier's *Annotationes* to Vitruvius from 1544 could be counted as a result of the *Accademia*'s work. In 1986 the systematically ordered drawings of antique reliefs from the Codices *Coburgensis* and *Pighianus* were added to this short list as preparations for the 15th and 17th volume.

My paper will explain, that there are many more – mostly manuscript – sources and drawings surviving from the Renaissance that – due to modern disciplinary boundaries – have never been seen together as preparations for this important – in a strictly modern sense: – scientific research and publishing program. Most of these sources still are waiting for their scientific rediscovery and examination.
